At their session today, the Delaware County Board of Commissioners passed a resolution declaring Delaware County as a “Purple Heart County.” The designation “Purple Heart” pays tribute to the 1.7 million veterans who have received the Purple Heart medal, our nation’s highest military medal in recognition of their wounds received in combat.

“I believe the designation of “Purple Heart,” and this year’s Memorial Day ceremonies, can help county officials honor the 11,051 veterans living in our county. A current employee of Delaware County Facilities Department, Dave Maggard, was honored by participating in the raising of the flag. Joining in the flag raising was Delaware County EMA Director LT. Brian Galligher, Navy Reservist, representing our active military. Also on hand was Katherine Lee Colburn, Armed Forces Council, presenting the Rainbow Wishes declaration.

Delaware County joins three other Purple Heart Counties, Licking County in Ohio, and Shasta and Kern Counties in California in the United States.
